Trans Singela Area, Khaltse Block Leh Ladakh, Kashmir, India

nder the National Programme for Health Care of Elderly (NPHCE), geriatric camps were conducted at six villages and hamlets in the Trans Singela area of Khaltse Block, Leh Ladakh from August 01 2013 to August 11, 2013.

The Trans Singela area is a region across the Singela Pass. Situated 17,000 feet above sea level, the area contains around 6 small villages and hamlets that are isolated for half the year. The population of the Trans Singela area is very small and accessibility is very difficult. A team normally has to journey for 7 to 9 days under arduous conditions to get through the passes, though a road is currently being constructed to help with accessibility under PMGSY, the nationwide plan in India to provide roads to isolated populations.

Health care facilities in the Singela Pass comprise of one primary health centre and four sub-centres. Though some healthcare workers works in these facilities, doctors have never been posted. Due the harsh climate and difficult terrain, the people living in the area have been deprived of quality health care.

Because of the need to provide healthcare for all populations, this Geriatric Health camp was planned to provide different specialist services to the six villages of Singela Pass.



August 1, 2013 We reached Photksar Village (population: 235) at around noon. The health camp was held in the afternoon, where we examined and treated 131 patients.

August 2, 2013

We reached Yulchung Village (population: 144) at around 11:00 AM after crossing Singela pass. A camp was organized and 113 patients were treated.





August 3, 2013 We reached Neyrkas village (population: 104) at around 11:00 AM.

Medical equipment, such as portable X-ray machines, ultrasound machines, and medication had to be carried on horseback or on back packs.

A camp was organized there, and 47 patients were examined and treated. We returned to Yulchung village late in the evening.

August 4, 2013

We crossed Khupala pass to reach Skumpata village (pop: 100) at around noon. A camp was organized in the afternoon, where 53 patients were examined and treated.

The following services were provided during the camps:

- 1. Specialist Consultations
- 2. Screening under NCD (Blood sugar, BP, BMI)
- 3. School Health check up
- 4. Lab tests including HbsAg and HIV testing
- 5. X-ray
- 6. Ultrasound

- 7. ECG Machine
- 8. Vaccination including Pentavalent
- 9. Training of ASHAs and FMPHW in MCTS
- 10. Family Welfare services (IUCD insertion, Condom, Oral pills)
- 11. Cataract screening
- 12. Distribution of Aids and Appliances under NPHCE
- 13. Health Education and IEC



In all 255, patients were seen by the specialist. It was for the first time in the history that a team from the health department had come with these equipment.

August 5, 2013 Our next destination was Lingshed village. It was the biggest in the area with a population of 435 people.

We reached Lingshed village at 10:00 AM, and a camp was organized in the afternoon.



August 6, 2013 Due to the large population, the camp continued its stay in Lingshed.

The team was under the overall supervision of Dr. Rinchen Chorol, BMO, Khaltse. We were also accompanied by technicians who assisted with the procedures.





August 7, 2013 The next destination was Dibling village (Pop:84). We reached Dibling after 13 hours of hiking.

August 8, 2013 Due to the length of the journey, the camp had to be organized the next day. 50 patients were examined

and treated.

August 9, 2013

An alternate route to Rangdum village in Kargil district had to be taken. This detour involved crossing Pigdongla pass and spending one night in open.

August 11, 2013

Finally, we reached Leh in the evening.



We reached Rangdum and drove up to Kargil.
